1 MR. CARNEY: Good evening. We are calling the
2 Police Board meeting of June 18th to order. The
3 first item of business, the approval of the minutes
4 of the Board's public meeting of May 21, 2015. Is
5 there a motion? (Motion.) Second? (Second.) All
6 those in favor say I. The motion passes. Hopefully
7 we have a quorum. I'm making assumptions here. Our
8 next public meeting will be held on Thursday,
9 July 16th at 7:30 here at the Office of Public
10 Safety.

11 At this time, I ask for a motion to close
12 a series of executive sessions for purposes of
13 considering litigation and personnel matters as
14 authorized by the Open Meetings Act. Is there a
15 motion? (Motion.) Second? (Second.) All in favor
16 say I. The motion passes.

17 A report of disciplinary actions taken by
18 the Board have been made available at this evening's
19 meeting. This report and the Board's written
20 finding and decision are posted on the Board's
21 website.

22 There are no disciplinary cases on the
23 agenda for final action at this evening's meeting.
24 Copies of orders issued by the Superintendent during

1 the previous month are listed in blue books and are
2 available on the police department's website.

3 The next item is the Superintendent's
4 report. Do I have a motion to waive the oral report
5 and receive the monthly report in writing?

6 (Motion.) So moved. Second? (Second.) All those
7 in favor say I. The motion passes.

8 Now, I'll call upon those members who
9 signed up to speak in advance. When your name is
10 called, please step up to the microphone. We ask
11 that you limit your comments to two minutes. Kevin
12 Ammons. How are you, sir?

13 MR. AMMONS: Good.

14 MR. CARNEY: Welcome.

15 MR. AMMONS: Well, I came here today. This is
16 my first time ever coming here without even knowing
17 the process with the two-minute restriction, so I'm
18 going to try to hurry up and get to the point. It's
19 with the greatest respect that I come before you
20 all, but I wanted to share some things as it related
21 to things that I felt could help enhance what we are
22 doing. I'm a community activist in the 21st Ward,
23 and I see what's happening with our kids dying every
24 day, you know. There's a lot of other things that I

1 feel we can possibly do. So I wanted to have an
2 opportunity to talk to somebody to share that, but I
3 will just throw a couple of things out there and one
4 of those things would be to find a way to integrate
5 the camera system that we already have to the 911
6 center. Because I don't understand why we have
7 cameras in place and we still have drive-by
8 shootings, you know. We have a -- you have to call
9 and all it takes is to press a button and you would
10 be activated to the main intersections where you
11 could possibly see something.

12 And the second suggestion would be to
13 possibly turn the back seats around in SUVs that the
14 police are riding in because that's your way of
15 putting eyes in the back of the heads of the other
16 two officers.

17 And I have seen situations where the
18 police have pulled up and everybody's ducking in the
19 gangway and hide, and as soon as they pull off, the
20 same people the police are looking for come out and
21 look. I'm thinking maybe if that back seat had been
22 rotating, it could possibly help because you got two
23 officers back there. They would see what the other
24 two officers don't see. But I would like to have an

1 opportunity to share some other things with
2 somebody, you know. So if it's somebody I could
3 talk to, I would appreciate it.

4 MR. CARNEY: Those are good suggestions. I
5 would suggest the Deputy Superintendent.

6 MR. WYSINGER: I'll speak with you afterwards.

7 MR. AMMONS: Thank you.

8 MR. CARNEY: Thank you for coming. Larone
9 Ellison.

10 UNKNOWN WOMAN: He's the one with the baby
11 changing her.

12 MR. CARNEY: All right. We will allow him to
13 come back. LaCreshia Birts.

14 MS. BIRTS: Good evening.

15 MR. CARNEY: How are you?

16 MS. BIRTS: I'm not fine considering that we
17 have to keep coming here and we haven't gotten
18 results. So you asked me how I was. I'm here to
19 talk about the firing of Dante Servin, and I address
20 this to all the Board members. We are not blind.
21 We know that there is a message in our actions and
22 inactions. We see how swift and willing the Board
23 is to terminate members of the department for minor
24 infractions such as having a cigarette or a cigar in

1 one's mouth as evidenced in the CPD handbook or
2 writing false parking tickets, which was
3 justification for the officer fired at the last
4 Board meeting.

5 But why has this department been slow and
6 defiant when it comes to punishing cops for murder,
7 specifically, the murder of black innocent
8 civilians? The message, whether intended or
9 unintended, is that black life is not as important
10 as the officer's right to shoot when in fear for
11 their lives. But what about the justifiable and
12 insurmountable fear that black people, my brothers
13 and sisters have? What do we do with our fear?
14 Should we arm ourselves and be willing to take
15 justice in our own hands, or should we continue to
16 wait idly for entities like you to finally do what
17 is right?

18 How long will we have to wait? How long
19 will we have to wait? I'm wondering where are you
20 in this process of firing Dante Servin.

21 MR. CARNEY: Well, I have to turn that over to
22 Scott from IPRA. If you could just comment on that.
23 The case sits in your arms right now.

24 MR. ANDO: Right.

1 MR. CARNEY: IPRA is the -- you understand the
2 difference between IPRA and the Police Board?

3 MS. BIRTS: Yes.

4 MR. CARNEY: IPRA investigates.

5 MR. ANDO: Hi. As you probably are well
6 aware, the criminal case was recently concluded with
7 a directed verdict of not guilty, and IPRA then
8 resumes its administrative investigation. We always
9 put an officer-involved shooting investigation
10 administratively in abeyance until the criminal case
11 is concluded so that we don't jeopardize the more
12 important criminal case. But now that that's
13 happened, we are now going forward in concluding our
14 investigation. I don't think it will be much longer
15 before we are done, but we still have to go through
16 the process of completing the investigation.

17 MS. BIRTS: Okay.

18 MR. CARNEY: Thank you. Rachel Williams.
19 Good evening, how are you?

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Not well at this moment.

21 MR. CARNEY: Thank you.

22 MS. WILLIAMS: I came to you guys on the 20th
23 of May. It was about Dante Servin being fired.

24 Now, the day after I get a -- my mother gets a

1 letter from IPRA saying that the officer who hit my
2 mother in the face was exonerated. I'll read you
3 this. "The Independent Police Review Authority has
4 conducted and completed a thorough investigation
5 into the allegations of misconduct by the Chicago
6 Police Department that you reported. All the
7 available evidence has been evaluated and it has
8 been determined that this complaint log number is
9 exonerated. A finding of exonerated means that the
10 officer in question did what he or she was accused
11 of but was justified in doing it." I don't know if
12 you know, but you're on the letter, the Chief
13 Administrator.

14 Now, On September 30th, my family made a
15 call in to my aunt who was literally dying, and the
16 same officer who hit my mother has been harassing my
17 family for the last ten years. He was -- there was
18 no need for him to come for that call. It was a
19 call for EMT and as police officers doubled as EMTs,
20 there never was a need for him to come to that call.
21 But because that call came to that specific house,
22 he felt the need to come through. So as family are
23 trying to get one of their loved ones taken out, he
24 decides to swing, try to tase my cousin. When my

1 mother stepped in and tried to-- he then hits my
2 mother.

3 When my mother reported it to the desk
4 sergeant at 111th, right off of the Walmart, that
5 desk sergeant literally said well, you can't report
6 it here. So my mother reported it to IPRA, went
7 down to IPRA to the headquarters and reported it.

8 To say he was exonerated for the -- for
9 that? To say he was exonerated for causing bodily
10 harm to a woman who was trying to protect her
11 nephew, because the officer who has consistently
12 harassed the same person, decides to try to tase him
13 as he is in pain because his mother is dying on the
14 floor. I don't know how that's a thorough
15 investigation or how he is exonerated, and how you
16 can sit there and say he needs to be exonerated.
17 Never give him the review of saying something
18 happened.

19 And the same officer who hit my mother,
20 put my cousin in handcuffs as his mother lay dying
21 as he couldn't say his last goodbyes to his mother,
22 charges my cousin, and then the charges are thrown
23 out.

24 Consistently this same officer, Detective

1 Ramos, has consistently harassed my family
2 consistently. And more and more he gets bold with
3 it. He was bold enough to tase my cousin three
4 years ago. He was bold enough to hit my mother, and
5 you have no -- he gets repercussions for it. So if
6 he had shot at my mother, had he tased my mother,
7 you would have said he was exonerated in the same
8 sense? Because a family is going through pain and
9 an officer who has no need to be there, because
10 EMTs, EMT meaning ambulance, was called for that
11 specific need. There was never a need for him to be
12 there.

13 There was never a need for my family to
14 go through the pain as my cousin was arrested, as my
15 mother's face was swollen, as my mother was
16 preparing to bury her only sister as she lay dying
17 on the floor. Because I'm getting the same thing,
18 if it was your family you would want the same thing
19 not to happen. Because if you have justification
20 for a man trying to stay safe, take my mother, a
21 woman who has justified the abuse, saying -- take
22 the woman, my mother, who has the medical license.
23 Who the detective came into the home, was not given
24 access to come into the home but came into the home

1 without regard as my family consistently told him to
2 leave the property because you're not needed.

3 When you tell people that somebody should
4 be exonerated for hitting someone and the family is
5 grieving, what does that send a message to you?
6 What does that message send to the family? Should I
7 call EMT for a family emergency? Should I call EMT
8 if my family is having a mental break? Should I
9 actually call the people who are supposed to save my
10 life and in the end result get hit? I really want
11 to know. I really want to know what you guys are
12 representing. Because if you're representing bodily
13 harm to your citizens to the people that pay taxes,
14 then what are you doing it for? It should -- it
15 says serve and protect, but it should say serve and
16 punch, serve and harm.

17 You wonder why the black community
18 doesn't trust police? Because the police are
19 consistently doing bodily harm. Not now, 20 years
20 ago, 50 years ago, 100 years ago, if they're
21 consistently allowed to do bodily harm and not get
22 repercussions, you really think we are going to
23 trust you? Do you really think that? No matter how
24 many black superintendents you hire, as long as

1 there is not trust within that community, you're
2 going to have the same result. You're going the
3 same results if gunfire happens and nobody says
4 anything because we don't trust you.

5 We would rather trust the gangs to do the
6 job. And let's be honest, IPRA is joke. If IPRA
7 was really about police accountability, it wouldn't
8 have former detectives in IPRA. It would actually
9 have community members who are within the community
10 who have no ties to the police who can do a full
11 thorough investigation. And that's it.

12 MR. CARNEY: Well articulated, Ms. Williams,
13 very well. Chelsea Sprengeler. Not here. Larone
14 Ellison, did he come back? Not here. Grace
15 Mattingly. Good evening, how are you?

16 MS. MATTINGLY: Also not well. I'm here to
17 speak about the case of Rekia Boyd who was murdered
18 on March 21, 2012 by Chicago Police Officer Dante
19 Servin. I'm a concerned citizen who feels that
20 justice was not served in this case. Not only was
21 Servin not convicted involuntary manslaughter, but
22 he also still retains his badge. According to the
23 Police Codes of Conduct Rule 11, officers must
24 perform their duty competently and efficiently,

1 however, Servin did neither of these. Rekia and her
2 friends were making noise in the park near Servin's
3 house. In retaliation Servin opens fire directly at
4 them.

5 How can firing a gun at a group of young
6 people possibly be seen as a competent response to a
7 noise complaint? Would we tolerate it if one of our
8 civilians did it? So how can we possibly tolerate
9 it when one of our officers does it, one of those
10 who you say is out to serve and protect us. Let's
11 not even mention the Rule 38 of Chicago Police
12 Conduct claims that unlawful or unnecessary use or
13 display of a weapon is prohibited or that Rule 8
14 claims that disrespect to or maltreatment of any
15 person while on or off duty is prohibited because
16 both of those were also obviously violated on
17 March 21, 2012.

18 How many rules does a cop need to break
19 before he loses his badge? Besides Servin didn't
20 just fail in his job, he also committed a crime. He
21 murdered Rekia Boyd. What else do you call aiming a
22 gun at a group of people and firing? Dante Servin
23 is a murderer who deserves to be in jail, not an
24 officer out in our streets where he can murder more

1 of us. Fire Dante Servin or continue to disgrace
2 the people of Chicago with your injustice system.

3 MR. CARNEY: Larone Ellison. How are you this
4 evening?

5 MR. ELLISON: I'm all right. There are no
6 male changing stations in the male bathrooms. I
7 don't know if that's necessarily something you all
8 could look into, but it was a little difficult to
9 change my daughter sitting in a stall so that maybe
10 can be brought up. I understand this may not be the
11 most important thing here tonight, but it kind of
12 leads into something else. When we say that we have
13 opportunities and environments available for the
14 safety and wellbeing of our children and our
15 citizens of Chicago, much of that has to come with a
16 -- not prove it or lose it stance, but it has to
17 come with a how so?

18 My question, not just from -- it leads me
19 to what was happening during the decision making
20 during the review of the man whose name we have
21 already heard several times. When the violations of
22 their own rules of conduct for Chicago police
23 officers, specifically 289 were not held up to the
24 fullest regard, meaning, a little girl was quote

1 unquote, "being loud and unruly," and the only form
2 of recourse was to point a gun over the shoulder of
3 a person and fire aimlessly. To not apologize, to
4 in fact state they were actually aiming for someone
5 else, and to make it seem as though being unruly is
6 justifiable enough for murder. I say murder because
7 accidental homicide is not accidental when there has
8 been a precedent set.

9 Speaking of precedents, my question is
10 mainly for you all. I recognize immediately the
11 responsibilities that you have, but what does it
12 look like when you look at the legacy of your Board
13 and the legacy of boards that will go after you, if
14 you say an officer can act with such wanton cruelty
15 towards the people they were sworn to serve and
16 protect and have no recourse? Not, he's off the
17 force, not he should be punished, simply he was
18 doing what he was supposed to do because the target
19 has already been justified as unruly simply by being
20 a teenager out at night being loud. Because if
21 that's all it takes, as you can see the person I'm
22 holding is very cute to you all now, sure, but in 14
23 to 15 years if she dares to look at a cop and
24 disobey his authority, which teenagers are known to

1 do, how are you going to look at me in 14, 15 years
2 and say it was justifiable? That's my question.

3 MR. CARNEY: Scott, do you want to go through
4 the process of the case, how it started and what
5 happened in the investigation?

6 MR. ANDO: Sure, I really want to given an
7 update so everybody understands what I said a minute
8 ago, expand on it a little bit. We do hold our
9 administrative investigation in abeyance when there
10 is a criminal case. Once the State's Attorney
11 accepted it for criminal prosecution and levied
12 charges and indictment against Dan Servin, we
13 stopped because anything we do, particularly in
14 terms of like interviews of officers, particularly
15 the accused officer, it would be inadmissible in
16 court because when we do an interview it's a
17 compelled interview. They have to give it to us.
18 They don't have the Fifth Amendment rights to self
19 incrimination. So that would jeopardize the
20 prosecution. We have to wait until that process
21 plays out.

22 Now that process has ended, obviously as
23 we all know, in the acquittal of Dante Servin. So
24 we have resumed our investigation. Now, it's not

1 that we had not done a lot before in leading up to
2 the criminal charges being levied or have not done
3 anything since. But what we are now in the process
4 of doing is accumulating all the evidence that comes
5 out of that trial, all of the witnesses testimony,
6 all of the court records. So we're waiting for
7 court transcripts and other things that we can then
8 add to what we have in order to have a complete
9 picture for the investigation.

10 Now, several of you cited a vast number
11 of Chicago Police Department Rules of Conduct and
12 Rule violations. You're absolutely right. That is
13 all part of our investigation, but we do fair,
14 thorough, and complete investigations before we
15 reach our findings and make our recommendation. But
16 I assure you it will be completed. We will make a
17 finding and we will make a recommendation. I assure
18 you of that.

19 MR. CARNEY: I think it was a while before the
20 case of Rekia Boyd first came before IPRA. I think
21 there was a lot of citizens outcry at that time as
22 well. Mr. Boyle, you were very much involved and we
23 were able to get citizen actions, movement at that
24 time was to get it from in front of IPRA and the

1 State's Attorney office and that in fact happened.

2 I mean, you don't know how a judge is
3 going to rule. We don't know. The judge ruled the
4 way he ruled. It's the way it is. So now it's back
5 with IPRA. So after IPRA is finished, Mr. Foreman
6 asked me to explain what happened after IPRA is
7 finished. Once IPRA finishes its investigation,
8 it's then given -- the matter is given to the
9 Superintendent's office and the Superintendent will
10 make the decision whether to bring an action for
11 discharge.

12 If the Superintendent brings an action
13 for discharge, then the case will be before the
14 Police Board for a full hearing. So that's where we
15 are right now. So we're going through the
16 investigation today. You know, a lot of people here
17 I recognize have been here before on the Rekia Boyd
18 case. We don't want you to sit here and feel like
19 we don't recognize you or understand. We certainly
20 feel your pain. It was just really a very, very
21 unfortunate ending. A young lady is dead. I mean,
22 no words can express or compensate for that. We
23 have to -- unfortunately, there is a process so we
24 have to go through the process. And if you like the

1 process or you don't like the process, it's the law
2 and it is the process. We have to go through the
3 process. And many of you thought the case before
4 the State's Attorney office, that justice would be
5 served, and unfortunately it wasn't a good decision
6 out at the courthouse. Now it's back and it will
7 take its course.

8 We do -- we don't want you to sit and
9 think we are ignoring you or don't hear you. It's a
10 very, very painful case for all of us. If you want
11 to speak, let me just go through the people that --
12 then you can come up and speak. The next speaker is
13 Crista Noel.

14 MS. NOEL: I'm doing pretty okay. Yes, I am
15 disappointed but I do want to make it clear, this
16 man wasn't actually acquitted of anything. What the
17 specific ruling was is that he should have been
18 charged with first degree murder. Let's be clear on
19 that. The judge specifically said it was an
20 intentional shooting, and therefore, he should have
21 been charged with first degree murder. Now, I don't
22 know about you, but that happened on April 20th.
23 It's what, 60 days, and you have a judge who said
24 that he should have been charged with first degree

1 murder, and it takes you 60 days to figure out that
2 he should have been -- that he's a murderer and that
3 he broke some administrative rules when you have a
4 judge who actually says that he intentionally shot
5 Rekia Boyd.

6 MR. CARNEY: But that's debatable.

7 MS. NOEL: Well, you're debating with the
8 judge though.

9 MR. CARNEY: I mean, you can debate with a
10 judge.

11 MS. NOEL: I'm saying --

12 MR. CARNEY: -- it was intentional, you know.

13 MS. NOEL: It ain't debatable. The judge says
14 that based on -- I was in court. I was in the
15 courtroom.

16 MR. CARNEY: But it's debatable.

17 MR. FOREMAN: Like every decision Clarence
18 Thomas made?

19 MR. CARNEY: It's debatable.

20 MS. NOEL: The point is, we got him breaking a
21 million rules, unregistered weapon. You can fire
22 him with one rule, can't you? We got one.

23 MR. CARNEY: But it's going through the
24 process is what I said.

1 MS. NOEL: 60 days?

2 MR. CARNEY: We have to investigate everything
3 from the criminal trial.

4 MS. NOEL: Why do you have to investigate the
5 criminal trial? It's administrative. What's the
6 criminal trial got to do with an administrative
7 firing, except that they said that you can see that
8 he was lying. But you got that because you have the
9 state's attorney's record. The state's attorney got
10 him saying one minute, he said please and the next
11 minute he said -- what did he say, I forget, but one
12 minute he is saying please and the next minute he's
13 saying people here have to sleep. He's a liar too.
14 So I mean, this is crazy, it's crazy.

15 MR. CARNEY: It's in the process.

16 MS. NOEL: We are going to keep coming and you
17 guys are going to keep being bugged by us.

18 MR. CARNEY: We're not being bugged by you.
19 It's good that you're here.

20 MS. NOEL: We will keep coming until you all
21 get that murderer off of the police force. We don't
22 want murderers that we know are murderers on the
23 police force. You shouldn't get killed because you
24 walk to the store to get a bag of chips. Now

1 intentionally or shooting over my shoulder, which is
2 a lie, either way it goes, if it was your daughter,
3 you know. If it was your -- his daughter or your
4 daughter, and somebody said okay, come to the
5 hospital. Your daughter has been shot in the back
6 of her head because she was walking to the store to
7 get a bag of chips. Guess who shot her? A Chicago
8 detective. Wouldn't you want us here? Wouldn't you
9 want us fighting for you and your daughter?

10 We would do that. We fight for your
11 daughters just like Rekia. She's not my daughter,
12 she's my sister, but she's not my daughter. And we
13 are here fighting for the family. And we will fight
14 for each and every one of you alls families if the
15 same thing happened.

16 So we are going to keep fighting for
17 these families that are out there getting their
18 children killed by these police officers thinking
19 that somebody got a gun and hearing bullets whiz
20 past their head. C'mon now. He said he thought
21 felt a bullet go past his head, and a man was
22 holding a cell phone. How crazy is that? We don't
23 want those types of crazy people on the police
24 force.

1 MR. CARNEY: Thank you. The young man behind
2 you, you wanted to speak?

3 MR. MORE: Yes. Do I have to come up there?
4 So my question was once Scott gets done and IPRA
5 gets done with --

6 MR. CARNEY: The investigation.

7 MR. MORE: Their investigation and it goes to
8 McCarthy, McCarthy, he has the recommendation?

9 MR. CARNEY: Yes.

10 MR. MORE: And seeing if he wants Dante to
11 stay or go, right?

12 MR. CARNEY: Yes.

13 MR. NOEL: So say McCarthy says he don't find
14 Servin in the wrong. Where does that lead the Board
15 at that point?

16 MR. CARNEY: Well, there are a number of
17 options there. It really, before it goes to
18 McCarthy, we should say what's the recommendation of
19 IPRA. If IPRA makes a recommendation that the
20 officer be discharged and the Superintendent says I
21 disagree, then what happens is the two bodies are in
22 disagreement and so the Police Board will get
23 involved as a three-member panel. A three-member
24 panel will review the investigation of the finding

1 of each, then the Police Board will make the
2 decision as to whether the case should go before a
3 hearing.

4 MR. MORE: Another thing that's a big concern
5 with me is the fact that I think -- I believe what's
6 been -- I don't want to misquote you, but you said
7 what happened with Rekia was something about bad
8 circumstance. I think with Dante, where Dante --
9 Dante was the only person that got indicted for
10 that. I think that the thing is, we fail to
11 realize, I went on IPRA's website, and just seen the
12 2014 reports. It was 15 police involved -- 50
13 police-involved shootings last year. 32 of those
14 was favorable. 32 out of 50 people that the police
15 shot last year were killed in the city of Chicago,
16 but that's what's on the report. I could pull it up
17 to show you. I just looked at it.

18 MR. ANDO: There were 45 last year and that
19 includes, believe it or not, accidental discharges
20 and suicides, but it wasn't 32.

21 MR. MORE: Okay well, that's something that
22 you all would have to fix because that's the only
23 number that we got. And then for the quarterly
24 report that I just looked up for January and March,

1 there was four fatal shootings. My thing is with
2 the Board, you see these epidemics of shootings in
3 Chicago with the police department. What do the
4 Board -- what recommendations do the Board have to
5 protect the civilians that's in the city of Chicago
6 from this happening? What do you guys plan on
7 doing?

8 Is there some type of task force or is
9 there something that you guys can do? We don't
10 think that all police -- at least I can't speak for
11 everybody. I don't think that all officers are bad.
12 I don't think that all officers are racist, but I
13 think a large vast majority are. And those large
14 vast majority that are, including Dante Servin,
15 should be removed and stripped of their police
16 powers as soon as possible. What are you going to
17 do as a Police Board to protect our lives? Not only
18 do we not feel safe when we go to the corner store
19 because of the gangs, but I don't feel safe when I
20 see blue and white.

21 I'm going to keep it real. Me being a
22 young African American male. I'm a student. I
23 work. I'm a law abiding citizen but in the eye of
24 some officers, they see me as a nigger at the end of

1 the day. So what are you going to do to help other
2 young men and women from becoming a statistic like
3 that, that's being killed out here by these police
4 officers?

5 MR. CARNEY: You have to understand, the
6 responsibility -- the powers of the Board. So we
7 don't create that type of policy. I think that is
8 probably a question that you want to a -- in terms
9 of policy to the Superintendent.

10 MR. MORE: Which is absent.

11 MR. CARNEY: Or the Deputy Superintendent.

12 MR. MORE: Which is here.

13 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: We have
14 policies to address that. We are now in the process
15 of revising some of the policies that we have. We
16 do have policies that are violated, and when they
17 are violated, we give them swift and pretty accurate
18 justice. But just like everything else, we do make
19 mistakes, and when we make those mistakes, we try
20 correct them. So just like outside entities,
21 police, other agencies, we try to police ourselves.
22 But when we can't, that's when the Police Review
23 Authority steps in. So we have added additional
24 manpower to our internal affairs unit. Just put a

1 brand new commander there who actually put more
2 detectives in the internal affairs unit instead of
3 the traditional police officers to help us
4 investigate and police ourselves.

5 MR. MORE: This is another question. Is there
6 a policy where the police officers are no longer
7 able to show visible tattoos and wear baseball caps?
8 I read a story. I don't know how true that was.

9 DEPUTY SUPERINTENDENT WYSINGER: That policy
10 went into effect last Friday, but we're still going
11 through some phases where the union is trying to
12 advocate on behalf of the police officers. So the
13 policy did go into effect last Friday, but we are
14 still trying to work out some hiccups. No visible
15 tattoos. Baseball caps are no long allowed.

16 MR. MORE: Okay, thank you.

17 MR. CARNEY: Thank you. And Mr. Foreman, to
18 my left, made a comment, and I have to agree with
19 him. I think that it is so important that the
20 community continue to come because this is really
21 the only forum where the community has a chance to
22 voice their concerns with issues of policing in
23 their communities. So this is the purpose of this
24 meeting. We aren't policemen. We are the Police

1 Board. So we are a civil review board. We hear
2 cases of misconduct that come before us. But also
3 the Superintendent was here many times, and I've
4 been on the Board a long time, and what surprises me
5 is that years ago the top brass from all the
6 districts were here, which really had an impact.
7 That's maybe something that could be implemented
8 again.

9 But we encourage you to keep coming and
10 voicing your concerns, and the Rekia Boyd case is a
11 very important case. So thank you,

12 MR. MORE: And I never got a chance to meet
13 Rekia, but I met Martinez, her brother, a little bit
14 after that happened. I love him. I love their
15 family, but this isn't just a Rekia issue. It's a
16 LaQuan McDonald issue, it's a Dakota Bright issue.
17 It's a Darius Pinnett (sic) issue. There's a lot
18 more of these shootings going on where we come from,
19 and we just want you guys to understand our
20 frustration. And if we have to keep coming back we
21 will, but it's imperative that you understand this
22 man must be removed off the force immediately. You
23 understand we will not stop. We will be relentless
24 with this until that man is really stripped of his

1 powers. That's straight up.

2 Hopefully, Scott, it doesn't take another
3 18 months with the investigation. I really, really
4 really hope it don't, and I understand that it do
5 take time to get all the evidence and everything
6 secured before you make an accurate decision and
7 recommendation, but just for our sake, we just
8 really, really, really want some justice, and we
9 didn't get it inside the courtroom as we wanted.
10 But it's really on you right now, and I think you
11 have heard a lot of us and a lot of our concerns,
12 and I really, really pry, man, that you know, IPRA,
13 ya'll really make -- you do what you have to do to
14 get that man removed. Okay?

15 MR. CARNEY: I have been on the Board quite a
16 while and sometimes cases can take a long time, but
17 this is a process. The process is moving. The case
18 is coming down at a good pace. I don't think the
19 case is going to just sit there on the shelf.

20 MR. MORE: What about the LaQuan McDonald
21 case? What about his case? He got shot 16 times.

22 MR. CARNEY: I'm just made aware of it like
23 you are.

24 MR. MORE: So everything is a waiting game.

1 MR. CARNEY: It has to go through a process.
2 I understand your frustration. That's another
3 unfortunate case.

4 MR. MORE: To me, Scott, you're the most
5 powerful person on this Board, because everything is
6 redirected to you, not even the Deputy. Everything
7 is really on you, okay? So I really hope -- Larry
8 is a great guy. I really hope you all continue to
9 do what you need to do to get these corrupt officers
10 off the street.

11 MR. ANDO: It just seems to be my day today.
12 I feel for everyone's frustration with the time that
13 it takes to get some of these investigations done,
14 particularly the ones like Dante Servin and LaQuan
15 McDonald where there is a criminal process that is
16 involved. That lengthens the process really a lot.
17 But we do want to make sure that when we bring a
18 case to the Board, to the Superintendent and to the
19 Board, it's the best possible strongest case we
20 have. We don't want to bring one rule violation and
21 lose that, then bring two more rule violations. If
22 there are multiple, we bring them all at once, the
23 best strongest case that we can bring so that we
24 make sure the right outcome takes place.

1 MR. CARNEY: Thank you. Very good comments
2 tonight.

3 MR. CONLON: I just want to say for the fellow
4 who was just up here, what we expect is not for
5 people to come here month after month and not get
6 some input from the police department on the issues
7 you raise here. We expect the Superintendent, the
8 Deputy Superintendent, the other police officers who
9 are in senior positions who are in the audience, to
10 talk to you and set up a process to address the
11 concerns that you bring to us. So that's why these
12 monthly meetings, in my mind -- I say we, it's
13 really me. In my mind that's the value of them.
14 It's not, as Patricia said, I think you have been
15 here many times. You came back again this time.
16 That leads me to IPRA and what it is we can do.

17 As Demetrius said, we cannot interfere
18 with the IPRA process if the IPRA process is to
19 reach a logical result. If we try to speed them up,
20 we prejudice the process, which simply doesn't help
21 the process and can hurt the process. If we try to
22 interfere with it, it has the same impact. The only
23 reason I say this is, I have sat here month after
24 month listening to you. And while I have listened

1 to you month after month very articulately talk
2 about this problem. There's an element of
3 frustration, at least in my mind, and we -- I think
4 they're doing the best they can and they will get
5 there. We cannot interfere with that. I hope you
6 folks understand. I sometimes think you sit there
7 and look at me and say gee, why isn't he doing
8 something? We can't. If we tried to do something,
9 we will hurt the process. That would not end up in
10 a logical result in terms of what charges might or
11 might not come forward. So I just hope you
12 understand that.

13 Back to my other point, nobody should
14 leave here thinking they didn't listen to me. I
15 have to come back next month and say the same thing
16 and the month after that. Talk to the Deputy
17 Superintendent, the Superintendent when he's here,
18 and some of these other senior folks. That's the
19 process. It's not just to have a one-time dialogue
20 for a few minutes and nothing happens.

21 MR. CARNEY: Very well said. Well, I think we
22 had really good dialogue tonight. We are listening,
23 and the only thing I can say is keep coming back.
24 You have to keep coming back because we're here,

1 this is the purpose, and we hope that justice will
2 be served. I really do. Just please come back, and
3 thank you all. Mr. Ammons, I thought you had some
4 excellent recommendations that makes sense. Turn
5 the seat around. But please share your
6 recommendations and if you have other
7 recommendations, please come back bring them to us.

8 Everyone have a safe good night and have
9 a safe trip home.

10 MR. CARVER: My name is James Carver. I heard
11 talk about a new insurance for the community.

12 MR. CARNEY: We're adjourned but I'll let you
13 come up.

14 MR. CARVER: I'm James Carver. We have talked
15 about new insurance that someone in the department
16 is recently, okay. He called insurance like, okay.
17 It's insurance can give back to the community, okay?
18 We have donations and contributions, you know, that
19 the police department is receiving, okay, and --

20 MR. CARNEY: Can I make a suggestion? I don't
21 know what you're addressing. If you could do a
22 little bit more research on your question, then you
23 can sign up and come back next week to address these
24 issues.

1 MR. HARVEY: I can do a little more research.

2 MR. CARNEY: Please, okay. I'm at a loss at
3 what you're -- of this insurance. If you could do a
4 little more research, and we will be back here.
5 Just call the Police Board office and sign up, and
6 we will greatly entertain your concern. Okay?

7 MR. CARVER: Okay. Do you have a schedule?

8 MR. CARNEY: We do. Mr. Caproni, raise your
9 hand and he will give you the process.

10 MR. CARVER: Okay, of the schedule?

11 MR. CARNEY: Yes, the schedule.

12 JAZ: With a precedent having been set on
13 hearing somebody after the adjournment of this
14 meeting, I do request that the Board give me 90
15 seconds to say something.

16 MR. CARNEY: The meeting has been adjourned,
17 and we too have a process and we gave everybody a
18 chance to speak. What I would like for you to do is
19 also -- I have to be fair. The same thing with this
20 gentleman here, see Mr. Caproni and sign up and you
21 can address your concerns at the next meeting.

22 JAZ: I just want to say I hope seeing so many
23 black people on this Board, that there is some
24 serious cognitive dissonance. And when you guys go

1 home, you will think about what Rekia Boyd and her
2 family has had to suffer.

3 MR. CARNEY: Okay, thank you. Everybody, keep
4 coming back. Thank you very much.
